**476** girls and women received counselling services.

97% who received individual counselling felt the environment was supporting and welcoming.

"Counselling has helped me enjoy life to the best of my ability. If it weren't for these services I would still be in a dark place unable to deal with my emotions from the trauma. Thanks to these services I am in the best place I've ever been in my entire life. I am incredibly thankful to the support I was given. I am now a braver, more confident individual. I now have the strength to want to live and enjoy life."

Volunteers responded to 470 calls on the 24 hour helpline and contributed a total of 17,837 volunteer hours.



85% of the callers who received support from trained volunteers said it made a difference.

**Opening the Circle** is a two year project (2013-2015) funded by the Department of Justice, hosted by Sex-

ual Assault Centre London and owned by the community. Survivors of sexual violence and abuse,

their family and friends, and community service providers are the project participants on a journey of discovery and innovation. The first public meeting was convened in December 2013.



## Message from Co-Chairs and Interim Executive Director

Sexual Assault Centre London's 2013-14 year was one of transition. Louise Pitre, Executive Director announced her resignation in December 2013 to lead Family Service Thames Valley, as their Executive Director. For the better part of 7 years, Louise was an outstanding community leader, a true champion of the agency and an advocate for survivors of sexual violence. She brought stability to the Agency at a time of uncertainty and has fostered a culture of growth, innovation and development.
